# **SECTION 4: FIRST AID MEASURES**

### 4.1. Description of First-aid Measures

# **SECTION 6: ACCIDENTAL RELEASE MEASURES**

# 6.1. Personal Precautions, Protective Equipment and Emergency Procedures




